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The Three Sasha's

Without warning, on the 24th February 2022 Russia invaded Ukraine. As of May 2023, depending on which statistic you believe, it is estimated that between 7 and 12 million people have been displaced. Each and every one of them is a person with a life, hopes, dreams and aspirations for their future. Each is linked to another and another until all of these personal connections spread across the world. Two of those displaced are guests here in North Thoresby, and it was my privilege to meet them and their gracious hosts recently.



Let me introduce you to two 'Sasha's'. Mum Oleksandra is a lovely young woman who escaped the war with her Aleksander son (a curious and sweet young lad who was chatty and as the 'into saving qoes, everything'). They arrived in the village late one evening in May 2022.

Both appear settled and at ease. Mum Sasha sits on a comfy sofa whilst son Sasha is busy collecting remote controls to show me. When you discover the long and frightening journey that

brought them both to our village last year, you may wonder at the human spirit and be amazed at its resilience. I know I am.

That day late in February 2022 rocked the world, changing it forever. For those watching the shocking events unfold it was unthinkable. Yet we were safe and removed from the stark reality of war. For many in that besieged country, the lives they knew were over.

This family were torn apart with fear and uncertainty their unwanted companions for the next few months. On the day of the invasion mum Sasha, along with the rest of the world, hoped it would be over quickly and life would continue, but she was advised by a Ukrainian soldier that she should leave with her son. Soon. Russian soldiers and tanks were coming into their town and everyone feared for their lives. The small and peaceful town in which they lived changed as the infrastructure immediately crumbled. Local banks and shops, and the large bakery factory, shut down. They had to leave their home, but also leave husband Sasha behind as he is on driving duties for the Ukrainian army. Heartbreakingly, they can only speak to him every week or so due to issues with the phone system and him moving around so much. I don't want to imagine what that must feel like.

Taking few belongings and concentrating on documents and papers that would prove crucial later in the journey, they left, fearing for their safety. Joining a convoy of others escaping the town they could see that the Russian army was everywhere. In a shocking and frightening moment, the lead car in the convoy and directly in front of the family, was attacked by a Russian tank. Terrified, they drove on.

Mum and son made it to a refugee centre in Poland set up in a closed shopping mall, with little money or possessions and fearful of their future. Several of the empty shops in the mall were designated by country of desired destination, such as France, Germany and the UK. The Sasha's lived for a couple of months with one kerosene ring to cook on and only intermittent phone access during the day.

Back in the UK. the Government launched ล scheme for UK families willing to open their home to those displaced Ukrainians seeking safety here. One local couple who volunteered are Colin and Jill Goodwin.

Watching the events unfold before them, they knew they wanted to welcome those in need into their home. But the process was slow, and Colin joined a few Facebook pages, speaking to a number of people and trying to find a family who would be a 'good fit', so that this new situation would work for them all.



I found it interesting when Colin told me that "Many of them asked to go to London or a big city. They wanted to go to a city for work but didn't know how expensive it would be".

Searching for a place of safety for herself and her son Sasha contacted them. "I wanted to ask if they still had the space" she explains in good English. The room that the Goodwin's had was available so after a few phone chats and trying to get to know each other just a little before either committed to the arrangement, both decided to put the process for them to come to this small corner of the UK into motion.

"Visas were a nightmare!" Colin explained. "There was a detailed 30page document that has to be completed but it was easier for Sasha to send me the information required so I could do it for them as it was so difficult for them considering their situation in Poland."

As she was taking their son out of the country, Oleksandra had to also provide a letter from her husband to say that he was happy for her to do so. Everything was submitted electronically and there was then a 3 week wait for the Visas to arrive. Apparently, this wasn't bad as some of Sasha's friends had to wait nearly 3 months.

Colin and Jill were visited by Lincolnshire council as part of the scheme to ensure that their (beautiful) home was suitable for the two Sasha's, and both hosts had to have DBS checks completed for safeguarding reasons.

In the meantime, still part of the Facebook pages and trying to assist others in similar situations, Colin was not idle. In the end he helped more than 15 other people to apply for their UK Visas. "I had experience of it so could help" he told me with a wry smile.

Sasha paid for their flights from Poland to Manchester but their gruelling journey wasn't at an end even then. A bus from the airport to Manchester Piccadilly preceded meeting Colin and Jill for the first time in person at Grimsby train station just before 10pm one May evening in 2022. The journey from Poland had taken 48 hours, a long time for a single young woman and her very young son.

Colin and Jill had support from generous villagers via the power of social media whilst arranging for their guests to arrive. "It was great." Jill told me, "We had lots of clothes for them both, and toys for little Sasha. Many were delivered straight to our door."

As the war continues like their besieged country, their plans for the future are still unclear. Little Sasha will soon be of school age, but Mum Sasha doesn't yet know if there'll be a place for him locally. "Maybe Fulstow if not here in the village" she muses, obviously aware that in many ways the lives of all her family are still on hold.

"I want to go back home" she says, and I can see the sadness in eyes that have seen perhaps just a bit too much. This slight woman and her inquisitive son have endured so much in the last year yet were welcomed into their home by two *other* amazing people.

It was humbling to spend an hour in their company, and I'd ask anyone reading to try to do one thing. When next you are watching the news, hearing the daily statistics of this awful war, remember that behind every one of them could be a Mum Sasha, a single parent in an unknown country whilst Father Sasha remains in danger to help his country. Then there may be a Boy Sasha, displaced and growing up away from everything and (almost) everyone he knew, but who continues to explore his strange new place with childlike wonder and curiosity.

I know I will.

In Focus: Matthew Durrant

Owner of Hall Farm, Ashby-cum-Fenby and the Halfway House

Matthew Durrant is a very successful, self-made, entrepreneur with deep roots in the village. He came here as an eleven-year old and, at the

tender age of 26, he opened small а restaurant at Hall Farm (aptly named 'Roosters') in one of former farms the outbuildings. He had obtained City and Guilds catering qualifications as a teenager then 'learnt on the job', as a chef at the renowned hotel George in Stamford. quickly



promoted to restaurant manager, then to Leeds and then a position as hotel manager in Middleborough, part of the Virgin Group. He describes Roosters, established 30 years ago, as a very modest, small business in the early years, with himself and one full-time employee as front of house, and lots of part-timers – with a caravan for home for a good while. The business grew, to a considerable extent driven by the wedding industry, initially using marquees, but, in 2002, a barn was turned into a function room, the old restaurant was closed and the current layout took shape.

Hall Farm now hosts between 80-90 weddings a year with around 50% of these also including the wedding ceremony itself. The business maximises the potential for diversity – hosting christenings, conferences and training days.

Hall Farm also has 8 hotel bedrooms which also provide busy trade for the restaurant, with two additional holiday cottages due to open shortly.

Twelve years ago, Matthew took over what was then the 'The Granby' pub in the village. The building has quite a history – probably dating from the second half of the 18th century. The Granby appears in many historic documents, being a meeting place for the Manor Court, the location for sales of property or discussions of important events such as the enclosure of the village in the 1840s.

By the time Matthew bought the pub, it was in a very poor state of repair and needed complete renovation, inside and out. It had had a rough patch for 10 or 15 years, with a subsequently poor reputation. This partly explains why the name was changed to the Halfway House, but Matthew also points out that it had long been called the Halfway House by locals, for obvious reasons, and an old photograph exists with 'Halfway House' appearing below the name 'The Granby' painted on the front wall.

Asked to describe the pub's approach, he describes it as a 'Steakhouse' – the 'hot rocks' method being a feature and a chargrill also available. Hot rock cooking, is the process whereby foods are cooked or grilled on a hot rock or stone that has been heated prior to the cooking process. First used centuries ago, the hot rock style of cooking has been resurrected. It is not only a unique experience, but it is a healthful one as well. It's a 'relaxed, informal place' is how Matthew describes the atmosphere created. Matthew prefers to employ locally and he specifically offers opportunities to 16-18 year-olds. After two-or three-months experience, he finds he has good workers for a couple of years.


Matthew says that covid has set back the pub industry – whereas Hall Farm has recovered and is trading above pre-covid levels, this has not yet happened with the Halfway House. He says both businesses face 'terrifying' cost increases - electricity costs alone are up two-and-a-half times, food prices have rocketed and while laudable, the rise in the minimum wage is another factor.

Like many successful businessmen, Matthew comes across as very modest and unassuming, very matter-of-fact. However, what is for sure, is that his achievements stem from a sound grounding and experience in the hospitality world, lots of hard work and long hours, good judgement and good management. With pubs closing at an alarming pace, we are very fortunate that we have two excellent (and quite different) establishments at each end of the village. **IW**

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Football Report

In the 2022-23 season, North Thoresby FC played in division 2 of the East Lincs Football Combination. After a disappointing start, losing 3 of our first 6 games, the run up to Christmas saw a run of winning results and we were mid-table going into the New Year. The Christmas break was extended by frozen and waterlogged pitches, and it wasn't until late January before games resumed. We had a run of 5 wins before losing to league leaders Grimoldby in the semi-final of our division 2 Cup at the end of February. For the rest of March, we continued our winning streak which moved us up to 4th place in the league.



In April, we still had 8 league games to complete before the end of the month, plus a Cup Final which meant we had to play midweek as well as Saturdays.

The climax of our season came in the final week of April starting on the Monday evening when we played in the final of the Junior Challenge Cup against Louth Town Reserves under floodlights at Bradley, on their show

pitch. In reaching the final we had beaten Grainthorpe, and division 1 teams Alford and North Somercotes. We started as underdogs but with determination and a large crowd of supporters behind us we ended up winning 2-1, picking up our first silverware for a number of years.



The last two games of the season were won and secured second place in division 2 and promotion to Division 1 next season. North Thoresby History Group

Remaining Meetings 2023

Thursday August 10th 'Doing Archaeology' David Start, archaeologist and former CEO of Heritage Lincolnshire, takes us through the processes involved in archaeological investigations, with specific reference to our own project in the field north of St Helens.

Thursday 14th September, 'The Witham: Lincolnshire's River', Jon Fox. A slideshow presentation from Jon's book of the same name which is beautifully illustrated with his photographs.

Thursday 9th November, 'Medieval Farming, with special reference to Ridge and Furrow', Professor Mark Gardiner, University of Lincoln.

At our meeting on Thursday 8th June, **Dr Lisa Brundle, Finds Liaison Officer, Portable Antiquities Scheme, LincoInshire County Council**, gave the group a wonderful presentation on **'Notable Archaeological**



Finds in Lincolnshire'.

There have been very remarkable manv discoveries in Lincolnshire and Lisa brought a collection of exquisite Anglo-Saxon items including several brooches and shield boss. а together with numerous coins and beads.

The main archaeological site Lisa spoke about was Cammeringham, near Lincoln, where detectorists discovered a collection of weapons and dress accessories which, in turn, indicated an Anglo-Saxon burial. Eventually 24 burials



were discovered together with 150 items, dating 5th to 7th the from Items found centuries included swords and knives, tweezers, a bone 'girdle-hangers. comb. For those who use Facebook. type in 'Searching for Saxons'

into the search bar to access photos and videos of the project. Archaeology is our theme at the moment.

Planning for our own archaeological investigations in the field to the north of the church has taken big steps forward with archaeologist David Start, who made an examination of the site on May 9th, agreeing to supervise the project. Next step is to have a thorough survey of the site



which will require a geophysical process something which we may need to fund (it will probably cost around £1,000) but we have recently been put in contact with a professor at BGU (Bishop Grosseteste University, Lincoln) who has just received funding for high tech equipment to be used by local groups like

ours. At least, there is a strong possibility of digging test pits this year. As you will see above, in August, David will be taking us through the process of archaeological investigations and will examine why we think it is such an important site.

This bridge that crosses the dyke between the football field and the rear of the Halfway House carpark is used regularly by the general public, dog walkers and football players. It is in a poor state of repair and is becomina unsafe. It isn't a recognised public footpath so is not the responsibility of any specific

body. I am appealing to any local business or a local tradesperson to come forward to help repair or replace the bridge before it becomes a liability with someone ending up injured. Otherwise, the bridge will have to be removed for safety reasons, losing this much used access to a walk around our village. 
